Introduction

In this course you will find an opportunity to develop an understanding of graphics and computer multimedia techniques used to create effective presentation and printed media. Using digital photography, illustration, audio and movies you will learn how to use the appropriate features of the following software: Microsoft Power Point, Adobe Photoshop, Adobe Premiere, Adobe illustrator and Adobe Dreamweaver.

Using video-based tutorial several examples of multimedia projects will be presented. The goal of this course is to provide sufficient experience and exposure to the software so that students are able to design on their own kiosks, portfolio, interactive presentations, web presentation.. The instructor will provide a high level of assistance.

Objectives

- 1- To learn and develop effective Presentation Techniques
- 2- To explore and develop various multi-media tools.

Teaching Approach

The course is divided into two major components (graphics, multimedia). Each component is presented through online video tutorials followed by examples and assignment. It will be mandatory that your register online at Lynda.com for the course materials (\$30).

Means of Evaluation

The course evaluation will be based on the assignments completed during the term.
