### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Exploration of diverse contexts crucial to a research question and development of skills associated with the evaluation and use of extant research. The effects on design research of social, political, economic, and cultural contexts, as well as of academic and professional practices, are considered through the assessment of academic literature, case studies, and symposia presentations. The course illustrates how contexts impact the researcher, the research question, the choice of research methods, the dissemination of research, and other aspects of practice-based research. **COURSE HOURS:** 3 Units

# **ONLINE DELIVERY / CLASS FORMAT**

This course will take place synchronously and online via Zoom (Tues 12:30 to 2:30pm MST) and will be supported by Desire2Learn (D2L). Students are required to participate in the synchronous Zoom classes, as per the noted times. Students will participate asynchronously, on their own time, to contribute to the D2L discussion board, watch videos, and to complete class assignments, projects and exercises, as required. If, due to unforeseen circumstances, a student is unable to participate in a live online session, please advise the instructor ahead of time via email.

- To understand the role of context relative to design research & research methods;
- To understand the role of context in innovation;
- Develop diagramming / visualization and other design thinking skills to investigate such contexts;
- Use diagramming / design thinking approaches to synthesize effective research questions and insights regarding one's research objective;
- Prepare an analysis of context as part of the presentation at the November symposium.
