Course Description:

Introduction to Design Theories is a required lecture/seminar course in the Master of Architecture program devoted to the examination of significant thematic developments in architectural discourse over the past century. The course focuses on five topics: the contemporary state of Architectural Theory, Globalization, Bodies, Environmentalism and Labour. Each of these thematic areas is subdivided into focused topics designed to bring timely considerations of the contemporary condition in contact with architectural discourse, design and production. Emphasizing the entanglement of these themes students are challenged to develop nuanced subjectivities to address the complex and contradictory problems that envelop the discipline of architecture. The course is structured around five core themes, each extensively explored through a multimodal teaching approach that incorporates lectures, interactive in-class discussions, group reading assignments, case study assessments, and a cumulative term project. Course Hours: 3 units; (3 - 0)

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will know and be able to:

1. Explore important developments in 20th and 21st century cultural and architectural theory through a series of thematic topics.

2. Develop the ability to engage with architectural theory and formulate new possibilities to address contemporary issues.

3. Develop a general comprehension of and familiarity with broad cultural debates that have occurred over the course of the past century.

4. Develop an understanding of architectural works of theory through an analysis of the theoretical views that motivated their development and production.

5. Develop the ability to understand, develop and participate in, and contribute to significant and sustained theoretical discussions while developing critical thinking skills.

6. Demonstrate a strong ability to write at a graduate level, including structuring and composing arguments. To develop critical reading, research, and writing skills.

Learning Resources:

The Teaching Team will supply a list of required readings and on-line resources throughout the semester that align with topics covered in the course.

Assessment and Evaluation Information

Attendance and Participation Expectations: Students are expected to complete all assignments, attend classes on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and actively engage in all lectures and discussions. Students are also expected to read all assigned readings. Detailed project descriptions will be provided throughout the term by the studio instructors.

Guidelines for Submitting Assignments: All assignments are to be submitted in accordance with guidelines established by the correlate assignment brief.

Final Examinations: There will be no final examination in this course.

Late Assignments: Late assignments will be docked **2% per day from the overall Assignment grade** (i.e if Term Project Assignment 1 is three days late, the penalty is an overall deduction of 6% to the Term Project grade).

Criteria that must be met to pass:

Final grades will be reported as letter grades, with the final grade calculated according to the 4point range. All project phases will be evaluated by percentage grades, with their letter grade equivalents as shown. A student who receives a "C+" or lower in any one course will be required to withdraw regardless of their grade point average (GPA) unless the program recommends otherwise. If the program permits the student to retake a failed course, the second grade will replace the initial grade in the calculation of the GPA, and both grades will appear on the transcript. If a student receives a grade less than B- for any assignment worth 30% or more, the student will receive an F grade for the course.
