Course Hours H (3-0)

Course Description

The nature of the building industry, stakeholders and many of the participants and their responsibilities. Brings together the theoretical framework of the architect's role in society with the practicality of managing a practice. Project management and office administration, trends, liabilities and systems for project control such as building economics; cost analysis and estimating techniques; and cost controls during design and construction. Also known as: (formerly Environmental Design Architecture 661) This course may not be repeated for credit.

Students will hear from various practitioners on the nature of the profession of architecture, the roles of participants in the delivery of architectural projects, their responsibilities, and the dynamic relationship among collaborators. The course will examine the architect's role in society, and how this is realized through the management of architectural practices & projects. Topics will include the structure of the profession, regulation and self-governance, ethics, project management, office administration, industry trends, liability exposure, project control cost analysis, cost control during design and construction, and modes of project delivery.

As well, the course will examine the process towards licensure and the stage and role of internship in the architectural profession.

- 9. Understand the process to licensure including the process of internship (E1)
- 10. Identify the current challenges & opportunities of professional practice (E2 & E3)
