Introduction

This course is an introduction to walkability and the urban design of Vienna Austria. This course may not be repeated for credit.

Objectives

- To participate in the International Walk21 Conference and gain an awareness of the benefits and challenges facing the implementation of walkable environments in an urban context.
- To gain an understanding and appreciation of the urban design of Vienna.

Teaching Approach

This field study course will be centered on the International WALK 21 Conference. Students are expected to participate in all relevant sessions of the conference and participate in relevant walk-shops

Means of Evaluation

Students will be evaluated on the following:

Part One 50%

Select a paper presentation from the Walk21 Conference and write a 2 page critical reflection that summarizes the key arguments made by the author, compares them to other papers in the session, and describes their potential relevance/impact on this term's studio work. If available, supplement the reflection with a copy of or link to the presentation, a short bio of the author, and a list of references for future research.

Part Two 50%

Prepare a 3-5 page illustrated report on one of the Walk21 Walk-shops. This should include a summary of projects visited on the tour and a critical reflection on the work. Supplement the document with images, maps, and floor plans as appropriate.

Grading Scale
