## **Course Description**

This course provides students with an overview of many common landscape construction and installation techniques and materials, with an emphasis on structures, paving, water features and sustainable landscape technologies. It combines theoretical, technical and practical aspects and includes some hands-on experience.

Students will gain hands-on experience in the construction of several typical hardscape components in landscape architecture projects. They will gain hands-on experience in the construction, to specifications, of these components, with each student gaining experience of physically installing paving stones and retaining wall blocks, along with the completion of other components associated with successful construction. The course will also explore the importance of daily clean-up to mirror job site activity, and at the end of the project, a complete tear-down of all materials will be completed by the students.

### Course Learning Outcomes

Key learning outcomes include:

- 1. Reading, scaling and building off a landscape plan
- 2. Project site layout
- 3. Understanding, calculating, and determining slopes and elevations within the landscape
- 4. Proper base compaction for both retaining walls and patios
- 5. Installation of retaining wall and steps
- 6. Discussion (not implementation) of retaining wall drainage and its importance
- 7. Installation of paving stone patio components
- 8. Overall and surrounding site drainage and importance
- 9. Cost and time estimating and budgeting
- 10. Daily and end of the project clean up and wrap up
