We will do walking tours the week of October 6-10. There will be three different times available for you to sign up for on Monday or Wednesday (regular class time), or Thursday.

Course Description:

Examines the built structures that shape contemporary cities, including architecture and infrastructure. Compares the urban morphology of cities globally and studies the factors that determine urban form. The course will consider critical concepts of urbanism with a particular focus on built environment and infrastructure. Students will be introduced to readings, case studies, examples, and practices that explain the materiality of the city. The course will be composed from lectures, large and small group discussions, student presentations, and written assignments.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, students will know and be able to:

- 1. Develop the means, methods and mindset to critically consider, research, compare and evaluate urban built environments and infrastructures.
- 2. Develop understanding of how historical design decisions shaped and continue to shape contemporary urban form.
- 3. Develop analytic skills to examine and assess urban interventions and critical design issues.
- 4. Communicate (textually, orally, graphically) the significance of built environments and infrastructures in providing for everyday life needs, cultural practices, and the quality of life in cities.

- Assessment and Evaluation Information:
 - If a student misses (or is late for) a required component of the course <u>for a valid excuse</u> or <u>absence</u>, they must contact the instructor in writing within 24 hours to discuss applicable options to submit and/or make-up for that component.
 - Alternate arrangements for missed in-person assessments with a valid excuse will be made on a case-by-case basis at the discretion of the Instructor and upon review of the student's class participation and attendance record.

 courses that meet twice per week) and one per semester (for courses that meet once
 per week) are grounds for failure in the course.
- Total Number of Absences: The combined total number of excused AND unexcused absences per semester cannot exceed four per semester (for courses that meet twice per week) or two per semester (for courses that meet once per week). Any number in excess are grounds for failure in the course.
