INTRODUCTION

Kingsland is located in the southwest quadrant of the City of Calgary. Major transportation networks bound the community on all sides. Glenmore Trail, a major east-west artery in Calgary, bounds the community to the north. Macleod Trail bounds the community along the east, and is a connector to the downtown core from South Calgary and Southern Alberta. On the south of Kingsland is Heritage Drive and to the west is Elbow Drive, both roads are major networks in the Calgary system.

Kingsland Community is a diverse neighbourhood undergoing redevelopment.

Land uses include single family residential, multi-family residential and commercial uses. These multi-residential units are predominantly located in the northern portion of the community. Commercial areas in Kingsland are located along Macleod Trail and Elbow Drive. Macleod Trail commercial uses predominantly service Calgary and the majority are not neighborhood oriented. Kingsland Plaza, located on Elbow Drive within the Kingsland Community Plan boundary, services the communities in the area.



DEMOGRAPHICS

The demographics of Kingsland don't follow the same trends as Calgary. Kingsland is experiencing different growth challenges than other communities in Calgary particularly due to the fact that there are so many multi-residential units. Kingsland is predominantly renters, living in multi-family residential homes, using public transit to get around, with a lower median income when compared to Calgary.

Some other characteristics of the residents include

- More immigrants and indigenous people
- less people speaking English at home
- Kingsland is an aging population with more people aged 65 and above and less children when compared to Calgary
- And more people spend more than 30% of their income on shelter costs, which in Kingsland is 33% of the population compared to the Calgary average of 22%

DISCOVERY

In the initial stages of this project, the Kingsland SAPL Team met with various stakeholders in Kingsland who shared a wealth of knowledge about the community. This overview was instrumental in getting the team oriented to the current context and history of Kingsland.

The following page is a snapshot of the people and places that have made Kingsland and will continue to build Kingsland for years to come.

CONTEXT

Kingsland was once a suburb on the edge of the city, but has transitioned to being an inner city neighbourhood. The residents of Kingsland are knowledgeable and passionate about their community, and have been highly engaged in community improvement projects and events. The residents have completed art installations on fences and walkways and organize a successful community clean up day annually.

There are a number of talented artists living in Kingsland who, along with passionate volunteers, have contributed to some of the art installations shown in the images on the right.

COMMUNITY

The built form of Kingsland is predominantly apartments (57%), there is a high proportion of renters (65%), and the median income is lower than the Calgary (by \$32,030). For these reasons, in addition to the geographic location, Kingsland is experiencing some social issues.

There are a number of people in Kingsland experiencing homelessness, unemployment, or are socially isolated (i.e., living alone). These vulnerable groups struggle to access engagement sessions, which planners must be cognizant of when making decisions. If the voices can not be captured, representatives such as social workers can be engaged to be spokespeople.

An inclusion lens (Viviana Reinberg, 2021) must be used when engaging and planning that:

- · Takes into account the disadvantages & privileges of certain groups in the planning and delivering of programs/activities.
- \cdot Makes adjustments so that groups who are on the "margins" find it easier to participate and get involved.

DEVELOPMENT

Development in Kingsland ebbs and flows, just the rest of Calgary and the boom and bust of Alberta. The location is excellent, close to Chinook Mall and on the busy thoroughfare that is Macleod Trail. The area is continuing to build up and there is a great amount of commercial to support the growth. The residential and commercial areas will continue to grow in synchrony.

Moving forward Kingsland has all the pieces to allow it to flourish. There is an excellent potential for both commercial and residential development that is supported by Chinook Mall, schools, restaurants, LRT, and City policy and plans.

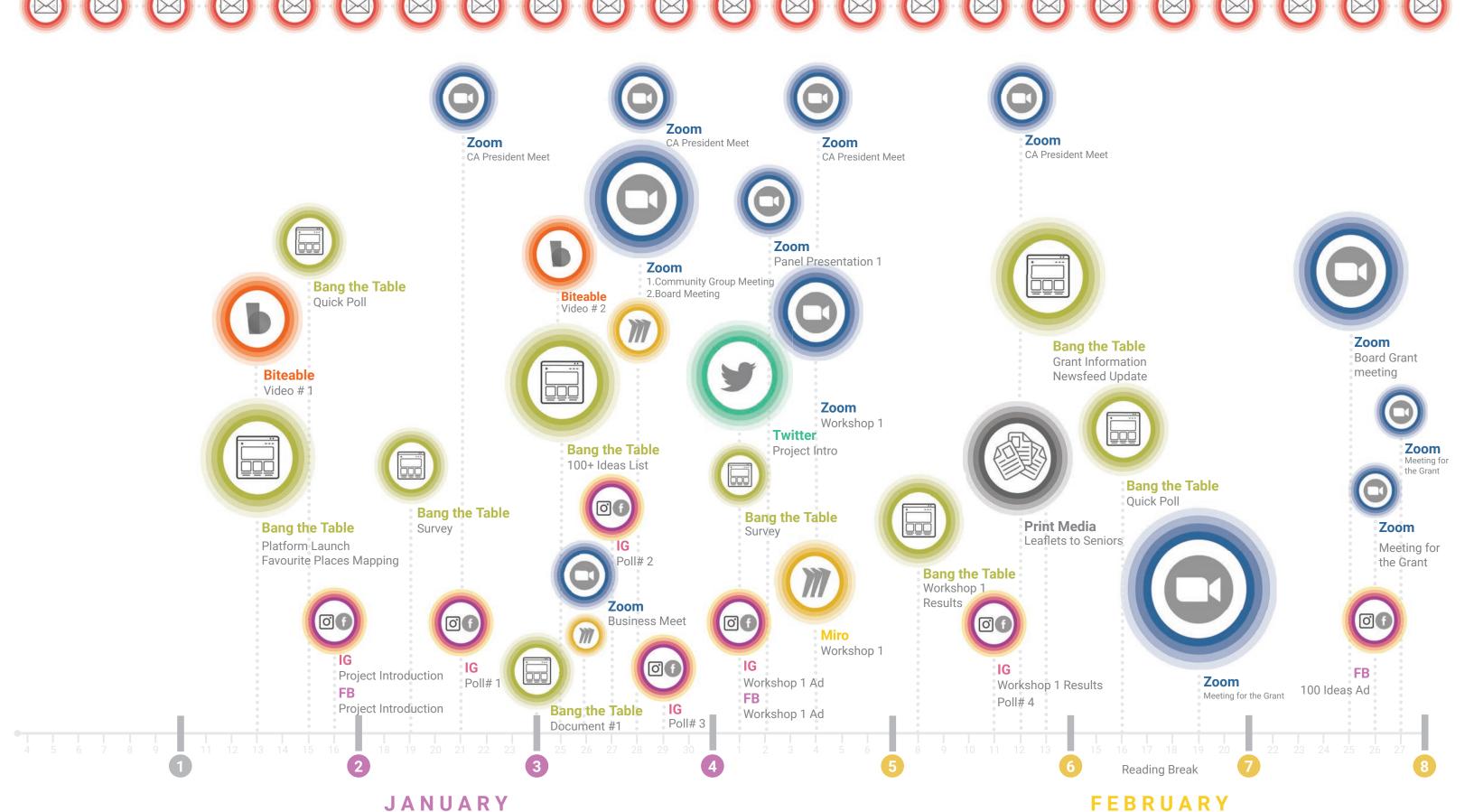




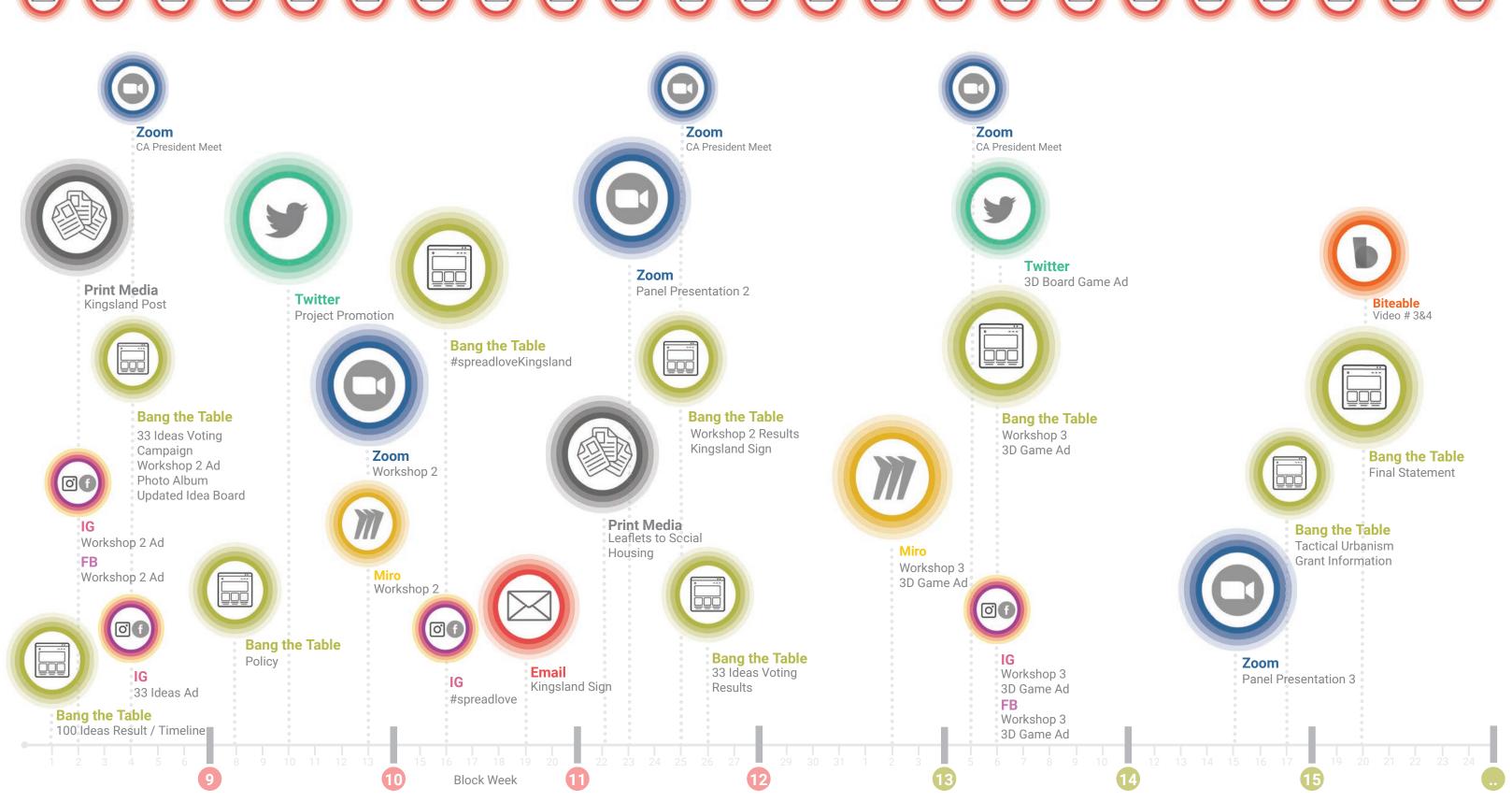

Project Collaboration Timeline- January & February



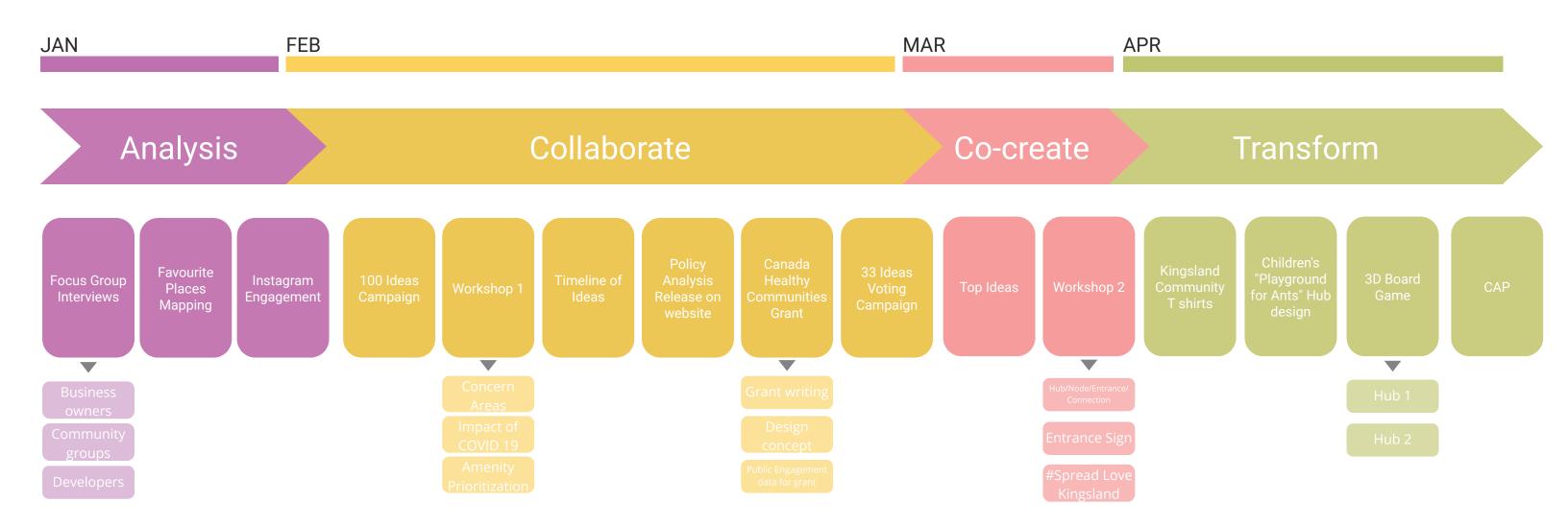

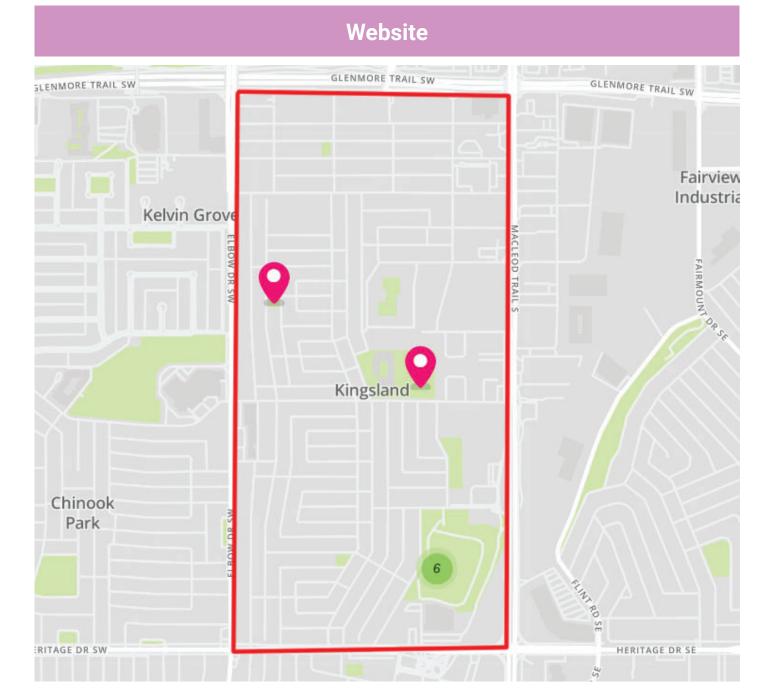

This exercise was conducted in order to understand the strengths & opportunities in Kingsland



"Unfortunately, this is the winner almost by default. There is ample green space and a good path, plus the toboggan hill and rinks are always in use in the winter. However, the remainder of the space is severely under-utilized. The storm pond has the sports fields which get used in the summer evenings, but there must be other ways to increase use and vegetation /naturalization."

"Vast open greenspace!"

"Favourite spot is dry pond behind day, would love to community centre - especially close to the small toboggan hill. I walk their often and love to see young families using the hill."

"I walk my dog at this park every see any improvements, more trees, off leash area..."

"The activities that go on around and in the hall are great. The outdoor rinks in the winter, Clean-up Day (usually in the Spring), the park, walk around the dry pond, toboggan hill, sports activities, frisbee golf may be coming, dog run (needs a serious upgrade), etc.) Hopefully, other parts of Kingsland (69th Ave & north) can/will be more included in activities (Currently it's like there are two Kingslands...a north and a south)."

"There are a couple of play grounds that are okay for kids. The dry pond is okay for walking around, but not particularly scenic. South of 69th, the area has been fairly well maintained. I walk my dog at this park every day, would love to see any improvements, more trees, off leash area..."

100+ IDEAS BOARD

The 100 ideas campaign was the poster child of the project. The campaign was an easily digestible concept, it promoted an easy form of participation from the residents, and it promoted collaboration amongst community members as they read, voted, and chatted about each others ideas. The brand has built a lot of excitement in the community around the future of Kingsland.

We ran this board on our website and Instagram for over a month to collect all sorts of ideas from the residents of Kingsland - we concluded the idea generation phase with 112 ideas. We then categorized those ideas into 10 common concern areas that existed such as increasing vibrancy, improving accessibility, addressing social isolation & improving community impression.

TIMELINE

After the ideas were categorized into the 10 concern areas, they were plotted on a timeline to understand the scale of these projects. The timeline helps to see when a project could be expected to start and finish, and how many resources a project may require. For example, a short term idea such as "using artwork to beautify" is relatively easy to implement and may require the planning and implementation of a public art mural. Whereas, a long term idea such as "develop the school site as a green space for sports activities" is a large scale project. A project on a large site like this would require a significant amount of time, money, and coordination between stakeholders to complete.

CATEGORIZATION OF IDEAS

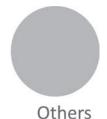

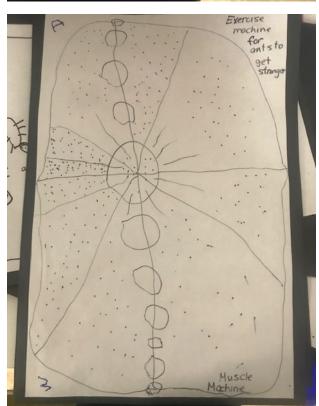
To capture these creative and energetic minds, the SAPL Team collaborated with the Kingsland Community Preschool on an existing workshop where the children designed the future parks of their community.

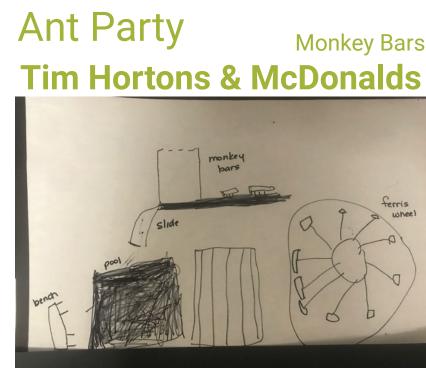

Do you view this process as a success for Kingsland and the KCA? Please elaborate.

Yes, absolutely. I personally find these opportunities working with people with different skills, energy and perspectives very motivating and inspiring. The workshops, website, and initiatives were all excellent quality and allowed us to think about how to actually take tangible steps towards improving our community.

Has this process garnered an increase in participation from community members and/or KCA members?

We have had a few volunteers come forward and I think part of their interest may have been because of the buzz created around 100 ideas for Kingsland. If people can see themselves in a vision or a brand (like the 100 ideas for Kingsland) I think they are more likely to contribute or get involved.

Has this process fostered a feeling a togetherness? And if so, how?

It's hard to say, I think you'd have to ask more workshop participants to see their experience. I think I have a few more volunteers that I am connected to and a few people that understand how powerful it is to brainstorm and gather different voices throughout the room, so that's a start.

Do you feel this process will help to empower community members to design their best possible future? And if so, how?

In my experience living here, I would say we are not a notoriously visionary or forward looking community. In my observations, we are more traditional and want to keep things how they are and tend to be suspicious of change and not stepping very boldly into what the future could look like.

Any opportunity to turn the ship towards feeling in control of what the next 30 years look like, and empowering us to think about what we want for our future is really helpful. This is an example where I hope that a few people maybe saw what is possible and we have some trailheads for where to go next.

Do you feel this process will lead to creating community spaces that are vibrant, inviting and utilized? And if so, how?

Yes! I very much hope so. I think it has shown us how spaces can be transformed and how we are really have a great deal of influence and power in how we plan, and advance things. We tend to focus on managing the hall and keeping things going but I am hoping that we can think more broadly. APPENDIX C:

WORKSHOP 1

FEB 4, 2021

This workshop was very important as it allowed the project team to introduce themselves and the project to the community members.

This workshop also played an important role in introducing community members to the online whiteboard "Miro". We used this whiteboard throughout the project and it takes time to learn how it works.

We started the workshop with an icebreaker exercise that doubled as a practice session for the participants. They were asked to drag and drop sticky notes and stars to let us know their age and housing tenure.

Secondly, we worked through a mapping exercise where participants noted their ideas for Kingsland on a map with additional written information.

Thirdly, we worked through an amenity prioritization exercise.

Residents were able to rank which amenities they thought were most important by dragging them to a top 5 list. This list also included an option for other ideas to be added.

The workshop ended with an open-ended area for residents to leave comments about their future aspirations for Kingsland.

After the workshop, the project team calculated the amenity prioritization table by designating each vote a score of 1-5. For example, if someone voted for the amenity to be first priority it would receive a 5, versus a 1 for it being place in the fifth spot.

APPENDIX E:

WORKSHOP 2

MAR 13, 2021

OVERVIEW

The voting campaign has really allowed us to see what the residents envision for the future of their community. Their top 10 votes focus on re-imagining the 2 hubs with a garden like theme that includes pollinator friendly plantings, community gardens, a farmer's market, nature-based playground, and much more. At the end of the day, Kingslanders want to spend time outdoors in these public spaces with their families and neighbours. This developing vision led into our second workshop perfectly, which we hosted this past Saturday.

9 residents attended and worked through 4 activities with us. The goal of this workshop was to co-create a master plan for Kingsland that incorporates their ideas throughout the neighbourhood. We wanted to use the workshop to help the residents work through their ideas and talk about some concepts such as seasonality and budgeting. The four activities were divided into the four themes we had previously identified: hubs, nodes, entrances and connections. These four themes allow us to categorize the ideas and work towards getting them built on the ground.

Starting with our first activity, the hub. We gave each resident their own game board that they used to design the two hubs: the central school yard site and the community association grounds. The task for the residents was to design a hub that would be active year-round while staying under a budget of 8 dollars. Residents chose activities that were for summer, winter or both and couldn't spend more than 8 dollars. Each amenity picture is drawn to scale so they can get an idea how much space it takes up.

The bubble size on the summary graphic represents the number of people that chose that activity, the bigger the bubble the more times it was picked. For example, the community garden was most popular at the central school yard and frisbee golf was most popular at the community association park. This was a valuable exercise for us to see how the residents envisioned the hubs, and also have them work through the realities of seasonality and budget.

The second activity was the nodes. In our previous engagement we identified six nodes that the residents felt were places of interest or potential intervention. We then took four popular ideas listed here that could enhance these nodes.

In order to dive deeper, we asked residents to write down what they felt were the most important aspects to consider when developing these ideas. After the workshop, we colour coded the responses by themes such as artwork, sculptures and signs, murals, or activities and events.

The third activity focused on entrances. We provided google street view photos of the 8 entrances that were identified by the residents in the previous workshop. Residents were given stars and asked to place them on the entrance they felt was most important and in need of a welcoming sign. We had a tie between 1 and 7 however number 1 has been an area of focus since the beginning of our project.

We then co-designed a sign for the entrance. Residents used stars again to show us what type of sign they wanted, along with the colour, artwork and imagery. The results showed the residents wanted something that was gold and black in colour and incorporated a crown. After the workshop, we used this input to design a sign for them.

The fourth activity was connections, we left this one more open-ended near the end of the workshop. Residents chatted with us about what works and doesn't work and jotted down some sticky notes. There were a lot of comments about pedestrian safety and improvements to walking paths. You can also see the different perspectives here, a lot of people starting talking about speeding and traffic, however one resident just commented that the "streets are quiet."

We then used the end of the workshop to inform the residents of the next steps in our project and to promote our new #spreadlovekingsland campaign. We also received this nice note from a resident that reads: "Thanks for all of the work you guys have put into this project - it's great to have people putting so much work into improving Kingsland and working to gain community input."
